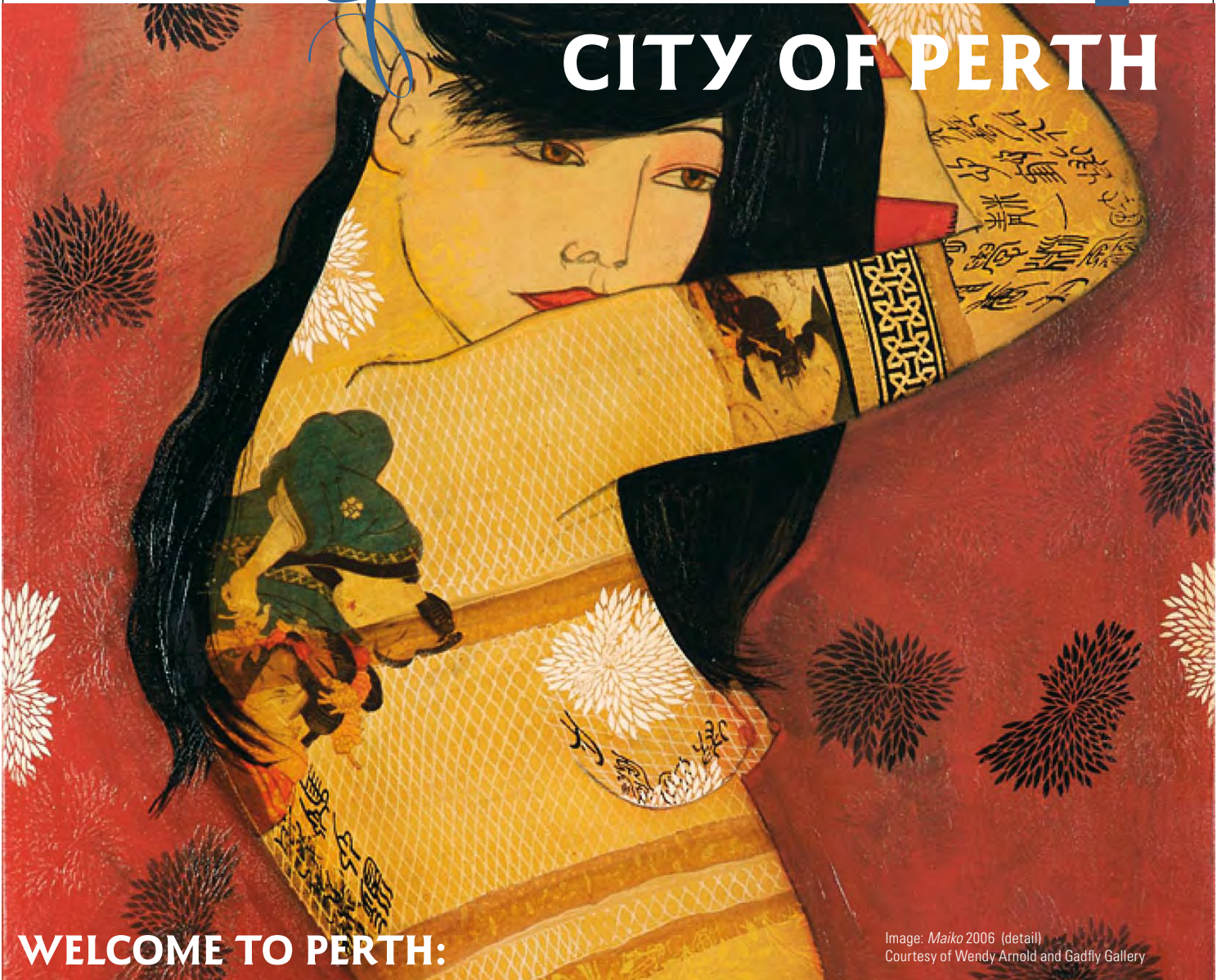

Perth is Western Australia's centre for the arts, craft, culture and entertainment. This vibrant city is home to many of the State's major arts and cultural attractions and host to numerous festivals and events. Here you can enjoy a diverse range of experiences all year round.

Most attractions are open daily and offer interactive experiences and guided tours to enrich your visit. State-of-the-art entertainment venues present a diverse range of theatre, dance, music, comedy and film showcasing the State's rich creative spirit.

If you'd like an insight into the extraordinarily rich traditional and contemporary Western Australian Indigenous culture, you'll find it here. Australia's leading Aboriginal theatre company, Yirra Yaakin, is located in the City, as are a number of specialist Indigenous art and craft retailers. Whilst the Western Australian Museum and Art Gallery of Western Australia both maintain exhibitions showcasing Indigenous culture.

Exquisite and original works of art, craft, literature and designer fashion from Western Australia's talented artists make the perfect gift or souvenir to take

home. A leisurely browse through the boutiques and commercial galleries is a great way to spend an afternoon.

In the evening, immerse yourself in music, as venues come alive with the sounds of local and interstate bands. If classical music is more to your liking, the acoustically magnificent Perth Concert Hall offers regular performances by the West Australian Symphony Orchestra, as well as shows by touring artists.

At the City's main theatres, which include the Edwardian-era His Majesty's Theatre, you can enjoy performances by the West Australian Ballet, the West Australian Opera, the State's leading theatre companies, emerging young artists and touring acts.

Perth's performing arts companies stage numerous events in spectacular natural settings during the warmer months of December to April. Take a picnic, a rug, and relax while you are entertained under the stars.

1 *Memory Markers* (2006), (E3)

Artist: Anne Neil.
Corner Barrack Street and
The Esplanade.

Memory Markers was inspired by the process of recording and documenting history and the written memories of Stirling Gardens, the State's first botanical gardens.

2 *Urban Reflections: Percy in the Mirror* (2006), (E2)

Artist: The Smith Sculptors.
Hay Street Mall.

Percy Buttons, was a well known street performer of the 1920s – 50s who entertained the public whilst they waited in queues to see movies and theatre shows.

3 *Kangaroos* (1997), (E3)

Artist: The Smith Sculptors.
St George's Terrace near the corner of
Barrack Street.

These life size bronze kangaroos are a realistic representation of how kangaroos might behave in the bush and make a surprising contrast to the backdrop of the city.

4 *Between 1979 – 1980* (1981), (D2)

Artist: Clement Meadmore.
Cultural Centre, James Street.

Standing against the city skyline is this geometric modern sculpture implies a lightness that belies the massive weight of the steel sections.

5 *Der Rufer (The Caller)* (1967), (D2)

Artist: Gerhard Marcks.
Cultural Centre, James Street.

A man who called across a river to attract the ferryman on the other side, was inspiration for this work.

6 *Gate 2: Coalesce* (1987), (D1)

Artist: Akio Makigawa.
Cultural Centre, James Street.

Akio Makigawa's sculpture has become a Perth landmark and meeting place.

7 *Nexus* (2002), (D1)

Artist: Simon Gauntlett.
Plateia Hellas, Lake Street.

Based on classical Greek architecture, Nexus celebrates the Greek community in Northbridge.

8 *The Impossible Triangle* (1999), (G1)

Artist: Brian MacKay & Ahmad Abas.
Claisebrook round-about.

The Impossible Triangle is a geometric phenomenon, that when viewed from a specific position creates the illusion of a perfect triangle.

9 *Ngango Batta's Mooditcher (Sunbeam's Living Strength)* (1997), (H1)

Artist: Toogar Morrison.
Victoria Gardens.

The Claisebrook bank of the Derbarl Yerrigan (Swan River) has always been a sacred meeting place for the Noongar people. A dreaming track meanders along the water's edge.

10 *Willem de Vlamingh Memorial Statue* (2007), (E3)

Artist: The Smith Sculptors
Barrack Square

This memorial commemorates the epic voyage from Amsterdam, of Willem de Vlamingh and his fleet who mapped the west coast of Australia in 1697.

A giant sundial with two clock faces showing Perth time and Amsterdam time is a living link in space and time between Holland and Australia.

11 *Channel markers, posts and seats* (1995), (G1)

Artist: Malcolm McGregor.
Claisebrook Cove.

Inspired by the channel markers used to aid in river navigation and constructed from jarrah timber salvaged from the demolition of warehouses on the site.

12 *Peter Pan Statue* (1929), (G2)

Artist: George Frampton.
Queens Gardens, Corner Hay & Plain Streets.

A replica of the famous original statue in Kensington Gardens, London and a gift to the children of Perth.

13 *Tree of Symbols* (2002), (G2)

Artist: Kevin Draper.
Cnr Hay Street & Forrest Ave.

Constructed using hand-forged and welded steel, the five metre sculpture takes the form of a wrought iron Banksia tree.

14 *Yagan* (1984), (H4)

Artist: Robert Hitchcock.
Heirisson Island.

This statue was installed to commemorate Yagan, a courageous Noongar tribal leader.

15 *The Sea Queen* (1995), (G1)

Artists: Tony Jones, with Matt Dickmann.
Claisebrook Cove.

The artist's childhood, learning to sail, playing, swimming and fishing in the Swan River was inspiration for this work constructed from recycled jarrah and old boat parts.

16 *Eliza* (2007), (C5)

Artists: Tony Jones and Ben Jones.
Crawley Bay.

Eliza is a reminder of the Crawley baths, built in 1914 and central to aquatic activities in Perth as a training pool for many champions, a centre for swimming, lifesaving and recreation. The baths were demolished in 1964 with the advent of modern 'Olympic' style pools.
